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### Update from CEO, Edith Moore

As we close out the final quarter of 2025, I am excited to reflect on the remarkable progress and achievements made by the Naut'sa mawt Tribal Council. By working together and staying focused on our shared goals, we've overcome challenges, capitalized on opportunities, and reached significant milestones. Our team's collective efforts and unified vision have played a key role in ensuring a strong and successful year. I want to express our sincere gratitude to everyone for their exceptional dedication and pursuit of excellence.

The first NmTC Board of Directors meeting of 2025 took place on January 28, 2025. At this meeting we welcomed Chief Nicole Rempel of K'ómoks First Nation to the Board and held elections for the 2025/2026 Executive Council. The NmTC Board elected Chief Nicole Rempel as Chair, and re-elected Chief Gordon Harry as Vice-Chair, and Councillor Cheryl Jones as Secretary/Treasurer. I would like to express my heartfelt appreciation to our outgoing Chair, Chief Steven Brown, for his outstanding contributions and dedication.

I am also happy to share an important update regarding my role within the Tribal Council. After careful consideration and recommendation from our Board of Directors at the January 28, 2025, meeting, my title has now changed from Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to Chief Executive Officer (CEO). The Board felt that this change more accurately reflects the responsibilities and duties I undertake in leading the Tribal Council. It is an honour to be recognized with this new title and I am recommitting myself to our strategic vision and mission to serve our Nations/ Communities.

During this reporting period, I have also been supporting the Xyntax Board of Directors with the onboarding of the new Xyntax Group Inc. CEO, Keith Busch, as well as supporting the Technical Services Unit team with the FNHIC Pilot Project for Condition Assessments.

I was grateful to be invited to Tsleil-Waututh on February 20, 2025, to join the Indigenous Marketing Solutions (IMS) team, si?áṁθət School, and Tsleil-Waututh Nation at the Pink Shirt Day celebration in honour of Kadence Lánahmats George. Kadence is our first Member Nation youth to be the selected design for the IMS Pink Shirts, and her Nəcəmat (One Heart, One Mind) design for this year's pink shirt is magnificent.

From February 24-28, 2025, I was fortunate to travel into the heart of Mi'kma'ki territory for the AFOA 2025 National Conference in Halifax, Nova Scotia. I learned a great deal from participating in the thought-provoking discussions and workshops, as well as from networking and building meaningful connections.

On March 5, 2025, Respected Stz'uminus Elder Wholwolet'za George Harris joined us at the new NmTC offices in Duncan to perform a Cedar blessing. It is such a great honour to have Elder George brush our new offices as well as provide brushings for the large number of our staff present for the ceremony. I raise my hands to Elder George for his wisdom, respect, and teachings he continues to share with the Tribal Council.

That same day, I also attended the IMS strategic planning session for 2025/2026 with the team. These opportunities to collaborate, contribute, and create plans for our shared visions and purpose for the future are both insightful and heartwarming. It is always inspiring to see everyone's unique perspectives come together in such a constructive and supportive environment.

Transitioning beyond the Indian Act is a profound accomplishment, opening doors to new opportunities and greater self-determination. We commend the K'ómoks leadership and the collective effort of the community in shaping its future. We look forward to continuing our relationship and supporting K'ómoks First Nation as they build a future rooted in your vision, values, and aspirations.

### **NmTC Emergency Preparedness Network Meeting**

NmTC held its first initial Emergency Preparedness Network meeting on February 25, 2025. The purpose of this Network is to bring the EPC staff of each Member Nation together to discuss priorities in their communities, and serves as a space where resource, knowledge, and information sharing can happen between our Member Nations around Emergency Preparedness. The topics discussed during the session were emergency plans, food security, logistics challenges, mutual aid agreements, equipment and training for the future. These meetings will be held bi-monthly, and the next meeting date and agenda will be emailed out to each Member Nation's EPC.

### Land, Water and Food Systems (formerly Food Sovereignty & Community Food Network)

As winter eases into spring, just like the roots, we've been doing some growing under the surface, and just as the spring shoots are popping up, we'd like to share our new vision of our team: Land, Water and Food Systems. We feel this better captures the interconnectedness of our work. We are looking forward to the busy growing and harvesting season ahead.

#### **Capacity Building Workshops & Training**

We are offering each NmTC Member Nation \$5,000 for food-related workshops, training, or other capacity building activities. The funds could go towards hands-on in-community workshops, support with courses and certifications (i.e. food safe, PAL, food preservation, etc.), support with members or staff in traveling to training opportunities, support in documenting knowledge (films, illustrations, etc.), food events/feasts, or be used creatively to purchase equipment/tools/plants/etc.

A couple of Nations have already come up with creative ways to use the funds, such as partnering with a local farm to provide paid training to their garden worker, as well as hosting instructional work bees to revitalize the community garden and teach people about gardening techniques.

### **Wills and Estates Community Engagement Session**

Naut's a mawt Tribal Council has heard many times the struggles that communities face after a loved one has passed. As a direct ask from our Elders Council, Naut's mawt Tribal Council received funding to start Phase I of our Wills and Estates project, which is to conduct a needs assessment.

As part of this needs assessment, NmTC has been engaging with different groups: Board of Directors, CAO Network, CFO Network, and Youth and Elders Council. On February 26 we held a Community Engagement session, where five community members attended and were able to ask the lawyer specific questions about their experiences to get information about this complex topic. Participants were supplied with a handbook to reference materials once they returned to their community.

Phase I of this project ends March 31, 2025, and plans on the next phases of this project will be determined on what is found in the needs assessment.

#### NmTC Youth Council Meeting: Welcoming New Youth and Expanding Knowledge



On March 8, 2025, ten members of the NmTC Elders Council and four Youth Council members came together in Parksville for a meaningful day of learning and cultural connection. 

### **Technical Services Unit**

### **Housing Policy**

The TSU Team has begun Step 3 of the Housing Policy Toolkit Update Project: Engagement and Facilitation! This step includes canvassing toolkit end-users with an online survey, conducting one-on-one interviews, and a toolkit review by Housing Policy Professionals.

### **FNHIC Pilot Project for Condition Assessments**

Five member Nations have confirmed interest in participating in the First Nations Housing and Infrastructure Council's (FNHIC) pilot project and to-date, approximately 250 building condition assessments have been conducted in Stz'uminus First Nation and Malahat Nation. Next steps include completing condition assessments in three NmTC Nations, data analysis, and asset management planning.

### **Building Inspections**

The TSU Team completed building inspection reports for homes in Homalco and Stz'uminus and is in the process of HSP applications for Homalco, Snaw-naw-as, and Klahoose.

### **Infrastructure**

The TSU Team has been providing technical engineering support to Malahat Nation including: the Oliphant Dam upgrade works, creating a draft RFSO seeking Planners, and support for development of permit processes.

The TSU Team is also working with students from the University of Victoria to develop a potable water maintenance plan for Stz'uminus First Nation.



#### Workshops

The TSU hosted a Housing and Infrastructure workshop for NmTC Member Nations on March 5, 2025, in Nanaimo BC. There was strong turnout with the Homalco, K'ómoks, Malahat, Snaw-naw-as, Stz'uminus, Tla'amin, Tsawwassen and T'Sou-ke Nations coming together to discuss:

- Insurance Claims Process
- First Nation Market Housing Fund
- · Building Inspections
- Procurement
- Housing Policy Toolkit Update Project

**Indigenous Marketing Solutions** recently wrapped up our Pink Shirt program and the WITS national pink shirt broadcast. A highlight of this work was being invited to Tsleil-Waututh to celebrate our Pink Shirt design artist, Kadence Lánahmats George, who was honored by her Nation in a blanketing ceremony. It was a powerful reminder of the impact we can have in uplifting young artists from our Member Nations. During our recent strategic planning session, the team shared ideas on how we can continue supporting Indigenous youth in the future—I look forward to seeing this vision take shape.

**Naut'sa mawt Event Management** also completed the first phase of our engagement with CIRNAC on the renewal of the federal Duty to Consult guidelines. By ensuring Indigenous voices are heard, the event team is helping shape a process that respects rights, fosters meaningful dialogue, and supports the future of Indigenous governance. The insights they gathered and the quality of their reporting will have a lasting impact on how consultation is conducted in the years ahead.

These successes reflect what defines Naut's mawt Resources Group—creating positive change while generating ethical revenue to support the Naut's mawt Tribal Council. This work not only strengthens our organization but reinforces our purpose in serving our communities. As we enter the first quarter of 2025/26, I'm inspired to build on the momentum we've created and continue driving our work forward.

Kadence designed the powerful artwork featured on this year's Pink Shirt Day apparel for our campaign. The celebration was filled with warmth and pride, including a heartfelt blanketing ceremony that recognized Kadence's meaningful contribution. Seeing the community come together to support and uplift her was truly inspiring. Kelly, Edith, Mikaela, Sean, and Niva were all in attendance to celebrate this special moment. Our hands are raised to Kadence, her family, her school, and the Nation for such a memorable day.







### **Pink Shirt Day Campaign**

We are incredibly proud to share the success of this year's Pink Shirt Day campaign, which continues to demonstrate the power of community and meaningful design. Thanks to overwhelming support we sold approximately:

- 3,000 Hoodies
- 7,800 Shirts
- 150 Bags of Pins

In total, these efforts resulted in an incredible **\$296,000** raised.



Funds raised from this campaign go directly toward supporting initiatives that promote kindness, inclusion, and anti-bullying efforts thanks to our partnership with WITS Programs Foundation. We are deeply grateful to everyone who purchased a shirt, hoodie, or pin and helped spread this important message.

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

### **Metis Cultural Training**

To strengthen Naut'sa mawt Event Management's cultural awareness and ability to offer distinctions-based approaches to engagement, the NEM team began a 6-week training course on the History and Culture of Metis in Canada. This training has been provided by Lorelei Lyons, and Indigenous Knowledge carrier from an organization called 2 Metis Women.



### **Line 3 IAMC Line Wide Gathering**

NEM Senior Manager, Annette Lee, recently led the planning of the Line 3 IAMC Line Wide Gathering for NEM's fourth consecutive year, continuing our organization's role in advancing a national movement toward Indigenous Regulatory Participation. The Line 3 IAMC pioneered the first-ever Indigenous monitoring program, working alongside the Canada Energy Regulator to strengthen Indigenous participation in regulatory oversight of the pipeline.



### **Terrestrial Cumulative Effects Initiative Gathering**

NEM Event Manager, Victoria Lepp, recently led the planning a collaborative event hosted by Musqueam Indian Band and Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC), which aimed to create a vital space for dialogue on cumulative effects. This gathering brought together TCEI-eligible Indigenous groups to network, share experiences, and discuss lessons learned in addressing cumulative effects.
